The monthly winners each walk away with R500 per team member, R500 for their teacher and R500 for their school.

The JSE Investment Challenge gives high school learners the opportunity to manage a virtual portfolio of JSE-listed shares. Each team starts the competition with a virtual R1 million and tries to make this sum grow by investing it on the equity market. The Challenge has

three different categories with differing risks associated with each of them. Teams can choose to compete in the Speculator portfolio (high risk), Equity Growth portfolio (moderate risk) or Income portfolio (low risk). These different games allow participants to select their appropriate wealth management strategy, testing their investment skills against peers.

This year's competition has five top prizes for the annual winners valued at R60 000 per portfolio in the schools' Challenge.

The competition ends on 26th September after which the winners will be announced at the award ceremony held at the JSE in October 2014.






Warrick Brant (1997) is the undisputed Strongest man in Australia (FASC and SHSU).


